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**THE REVOLVING MUSEUM’S “PROJECT SOAR” JOINS
COMMUNITIES TO BUILD AND FLY WORLD’S LARGEST PAPER
AIRPLANE, AIMING FOR A GUINNESS WORLD RECORD**

The 64-foot flyer, aided by thousands across the region, will attempt lift-off and flight at Fitchburg Municipal Airport on June 12, 2018 (Rain Date: June 14, 2018)

City of Fitchburg, 20 regional Rotary Clubs and local colleges are among municipalities, businesses and educators who are taking part and involving students

FITCHBURG, MASS. – Revised May 6, 2018 – Led by this city’s Revolving Museum and its founder Jerry Beck, PROJECT SOAR is enlisting more than 5,000 young people, artists, engineers, business and civic leaders, and citizens across the region to help design and build a 64-foot paper airplane to be launched at Fitchburg Municipal Airport June 12 with the goal of breaking a Guinness World Record.

Beck says the project, three years in the making, was sparked by his ten-year-old daughter’s folding and tossing of a paper plane that got the pair thinking how large such a simple flying machine could get. Their research revealed the current Guinness World Record for largest paper airplane was set by Germany’s Braunschweig Institute of Technology in 2013. It measured just over 59.7 feet.

With Fitchburg’s history as a hub of manufacturing and paper-making, the project seemed particularly relevant to Beck. The name PROJECT SOAR grew from his hope that the effort could ignite community engagement and help the economically troubled former mill city on its path back to vibrancy.

“It developed as a poetic and creative way to connect Fitchburg’s past, present and future,” Beck says. “This city was once a world-renown leader in industry and paper-making. Then economic changes set in and we went into a severe period of decline. But now we are seeing a renaissance... artists, young people, educators and city leaders are working to create a booming creative economy that we hope improves the quality of life for everyone.”

Over the past three years Beck, the Revolving Museum team, and local volunteers have done research, identified aviation and engineering experts, met city and regional leaders, reached out to communities in Worcester County (and beyond), raised funds from regional businesses, obtained support from the Fitchburg Cultural Council, and collected materials for the plane. In a poignant turn that underlined PROJECT SOAR’s mission, Beck got hold of the last rolls of paper produced by the historic Crocker Paper

Company before it went out of business in 2015. Additional paper has been donation by Caraustar Paper Company, the last-remaining paper manufacturer in Fitchburg,

“I appreciate how PROJECT SOAR responds to Fitchburg’s industrial revolution and the mills that lined the Nashua River here,” said Fitchburg Mayor Stephen L. DiNatale, who has supported a city partnership with the project since the start. “This community-built paper airplane is a meaningful catalyst that encourages young people to learn about Fitchburg’s history, be artistic, build new skills, feel a sense of pride, and be part of a larger community initiative. The City of Fitchburg is proud to present to the world this public artwork and aviation feat that showcases the talents and determination of our citizens.”

Another lead partner, Rotary International District 7910, has involved more than 20 regional clubs in PROJECT SOAR through its Rotaract young adult leaders initiative. District Rotary and Rotaract Clubs are engaging hundreds of students from dozens of regional high schools throughout the project.

“Rotary’s young adult members are excited, inspired and honored to be a collaborative partner for this unique project,” says Rotary District Governor Karin Gaffney. “PROJECT SOAR has all the key components that align with Rotary’s mission – it embraces strong education and science learning, and lifts the community by engaging volunteers, promoting diversity and empowering young people.”

The body of the plane will be constructed from bamboo, corrugated cardboard and paper. Visual artists, poets and others have led community workshops to build support for the project and create artworks to adorn the plane. Fifty student teams from classrooms around the area already have made artworks on paper that address issues they want to change in their communities such as racism and sexism, discrimination and violence, drugs and addiction, pollution and poverty. The artworks will be framed in black and attached to the plane’s wings, body, and tail fins, giving the look of stained-glass.

Regional community groups have transformed vintage and modern photographs, comics, newspapers, stamps, factory timecards, sewing patterns -- even homework -- to make artwork for the plane.

Fitchburg High School teacher Coraly Rivera says her students were fascinated to discover all the different types of paper – and what could be done with it. “Their drawings on sandpaper about stopping racism and bullying really got them thinking about the connections between their ideas and their materials -- and the power of art to communicate meaning,” Rivera said.

PROJECT SOAR involves thousands of students, faculty, and staff from Fitchburg State University, Mount Wachusett Community College, Boston University College of Fine Arts, Fitchburg High School, McKay Arts Academy, Sizer School, Fitchburg/Leominster Boys and Girls Club, and other schools and programs. In addition, the project will include 50 artists and poets creating new works for the project.

After its inaugural flight on June 12 at the Fitchburg Airport (Rain Date: June 14), the airplane from PROJECT SOAR and other materials are planned to be part of a traveling exhibition to be seen at airports and public locations around the region.

The Revolving Museum is a collaborative public art and nomadic non-profit cultural organization dedicated to the creation of public art projects, exhibitions, educational programs, performances and

events that encourage collaboration, experimentation, and a meaningful dialogue between artists, youth, and community members. To further its mission, The Revolving Museum:
